Appointments and transfers for 2015

he Baltimore Province had its quadrennial appointments and transfers in early June, with some different twists. Until 2009 the province made the appointment of rectors and pastors every three years, with the possibility for reappointment for a second three-year term. Now throughout the entire Redemptorist world, rectors and superiors have four-year terms with the possibility of a second fouryear term.

Also, in a few of our foundations, the office of rector/superior has been split from pastor of the parish. Until now in most of our foundations, the rector was both the pastor of the parish and the superior of the community. Not so anymore for OLPH in Brooklyn, St. Peter's in Philadelphia, and Our Mother of Perpetual Help in Ephrata.

We have closed the rectory at Our Lady of Fatima in Baltimore. The Redemptorists working at Fatima will now live at Sacred Heart in Baltimore. We are also closing our rectory in Manhattan at 61st Street, effective November 1.

We have returned to Newton Grove, N.C., a town the Redemptorists left in 1953. In the days of segregation, the Redemptorists staffed many black parishes in the Vice-Province of Richmond. When the diocese integrated the black and white churches, the Redemptorists gave up the separate black parish, and the town's Catholics worshiped in one church. Now Newton Grove has a large Hispanic population, and three Spanish-speaking Redemptorists have been assigned to Newton Grove and two nearby towns, Clinton and Ingold. Assigned to our new foundation in Newton Grove are Joe Dionne, superior; Kevin Moley, '62, and Mark Wise, '64. Here are all our new appointments:

ast year Father Jim Geiger, C.Ss.R., '54, celebrated 60 years since his graduation from North East. Professed in 1955 and ordained in 1960, he taught Latin in North East in 1961. He then went to Catholic University in Washington, D.C., to earn his master's in classical languages. He taught Latin and Greek in Suffield (1964-70) before being appointed rector of North East in 1970.

After two terms as rector in North East, he became rector of our retreat house in Long Branch, N.J. He then preached parish missions before becoming the last pastor of St. James, Baltimore.

His brother, Father Bill Geiger, was the minister in North East when Father Jim was rector. When Father Bill celebrated Mass in priestly vestments instead of his usual maintenance uniform, Jerome Chavarria told him, "Wow, even the maintenance men celebrate Mass here."

Father John McLaughlin, rector in Ephrata, used to say that Father Jim would smoke his cigars down to the butt, and then his brother, Father Bill, would finish off the butt.




